2019 Survey Report

In early 2019 the group conducted its first survey amongst the members and the wider public. The aims of the survey were to discover what the membership and the public knew about the group and the site, and to ask for feedback on our direction.

We had 49 completed responses to the survey.

Question 1: Who owns the Woods and Meadows?

77% correctly identified that the site is owned by Gedling Borough Council.

The bulk of our funding does come from Natural England grants; and we apply for other grants as and when they appear. For example, we won a grant to purchase a chipping machine from Veolia.

Question 8: A wildlife survey found that dogs off leads reduce the number of wildlife species by 41% compared with areas where there are no dogs. What would you do to reduce the impact of dogs on wildlife, and to protect sheep and young children using the Woods and Meadows?

This question allowed a narrative response to try and understand what thoughts people had on this matter. The narratives have been discussed by the committee and have been very useful to show us what is needed. There are not going to be any changes to the current setup, but we are looking at how we can help certain dog walkers who are not respecting the site to become more responsible for their actions. The vast majority of users of the site (both with and without dogs) are responsible and look after the site; even to the extent of cleaning up after others who are not so responsible.

We've engaged with the nursery who use the site most days for forest school activities, and they have trained, and responsible staff with the children at all times. They assess any risk and will ask owners to put dogs on leads if required.
